2007 NATIONAL LEADERSHIP AND CONSERVATION SUMMIT



The National Conservation & Leadership Summit was held this past month at Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana. It only lasted five days, but it felt just as exciting as a NOAC.

The 2007 NCLS had a two-fold purpose: to train and prepare the leaders of the ArrowCorps⁵ service project to be held in 2008, and to unveil the 2008-2012 Order of the Arrow Strategic Plan. As such, there was a Conservation Track (for Arrow-Corps⁵) and Leadership Track (for general education and the Strategic Plan).

Conservation participants spent much time in specialized training, including an entire day in the forest, enabling them to better serve you when you attend one of the five ArrowCorps⁵ sites next summer.

Imagine over a thousand people in two simultaneous games of



dodgeball covering 100 yards by 50 yards and involving more than 20 referees. It was incredibly intense and an amazing time! Overall, the Summit was a fantastic time for all who participated.

This year has been an eye-opener for me. I have traveled to the far reaches of our Region, meeting and having a blast with Arrowmen that I have met. Some of the highlights of this year have been the Japan NLS where I met over thirty enthusiastic members of the Ach-

pateuny Lodge, the Alaskan Conclave where I ate Muktuk (whale blubber) and participated in a milk-chugging mile race, the Hawaiian conclave where I gorged my face in irresistible food and mastered the art of the Frisbee Golf, the Wiatava Lodge banquet, where I was driven into the banquet hall in a Bentley, the National Conservation and Leadership Summit where the West reigned supreme as I conquered the National food eating contest and many more Conclaves, NLS's and lodge banquets.

Throughout the year though, a few unforgettable events stick out in my memory. First and foremost, the Order of the Arrow Wilderness Voyage program was extraordinary. My entire crew decided to travel 126 miles, just to carry our three 75lb. canoes and our six packs (weighing anywhere from 50 to 90lbs.) over the Grand Portage (the longest portage in northern Minnesota). We spent the first week rebuilding a portage trail in the forest and then ventured out on the water to complete our journey. Even though I did the same Voyage last year, the two weeks I spent with my crew inspired me to live the ideals of our Order. Both of my foremen (shout-out to Dizzy and Pedro) taught me that whenever you set your mind to something, you can achieve it regardless of the impediments that lay in your path.

The next memorable journey that I weathered was the Order of the Arrow Trail Crew program. Like Wilderness Voyage, this was the second time I participated in this program but it was nonetheless memorable. My crew was only the second crew to work on the Dean Canyon stake line but we managed to construct close to a quarter-mile of trail. The second week we summitted the second highest peak that any crew (including special treks) is allowed to climb –

- Baldy - and the highest peak that not many crews ever climb - Little Costilla. Needless to say, by the end of the trek I was sporting some pretty raw feet and some very epic scars. The most important thing that this year has brought me is reassurance. Traveling to these different locations to enjoy an array of events has shown me that the spirit of our Order remains just as strong in the hearts and minds of Arrowmen as Goodman envisioned. Brotherhood, cheerfulness and service have integrated themselves into a flurry of personal development, uniquely disguised in what we once called the Wimachtendienk. Be the servant leaders of your unit, district and council — let us make the difference and serve our fellow man!

Following the service portion of the trip we headed out on our voyage. It was a thrilling experience the first day when we were able to hold the canoes together, lash a tarp to two paddles and sail down the lake. Over the six days of our voyage, through beaver swamp, unkempt portages and the infamous "quagmire of doom", my crew members and I traveled an additional 170 miles, for a total of 190 miles overall. my life.

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

Mark it on your calendar! ArrowCorps⁵, a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, is just around the corner. ArrowCorps⁵ is going to be the largest service project undertaken by the Boy Scouts of America, as we work hand in hand with the National Parks to preserve their natural beauty.

The program is open to both youth and adult Arrowmen who are at least 14 years of age by June 1, 2008 and meet the Philmont height and weight requirements. As Western Region Arrowmen, we have a unique opportunity for the ArrowCorps⁵ projects as three of the five sites are in our own backyard. The project sites and dates are as follows:

Mark Twain National Forest (June 7-14, 2008), Manti-La Sal National Forest (June 14-21, 2008), George Washington & Jefferson National Forest (June 21-28, 2008), Shasta- Trinity National Forest (July 12-19, 2008) Bridger- Teton National Forest (July 26-Aug 2, 2008).

The week a participant spends at a site will be action-packed, including training on proper safety, working at the site, and a day of recreation. Our National goal is to achieve 1,000 Arrowmen at each of the five sites. We need your help in achieving this goal. Let's show the Nation where the Western Region stands by being part of such a historical event!

The cost for the program is only \$250 per person, per site. This will cover the cost of your food, supplies, and recreation. With the limited space for each site, availability is on a first come, first served basis. Contact your Lodge and get registered today.
